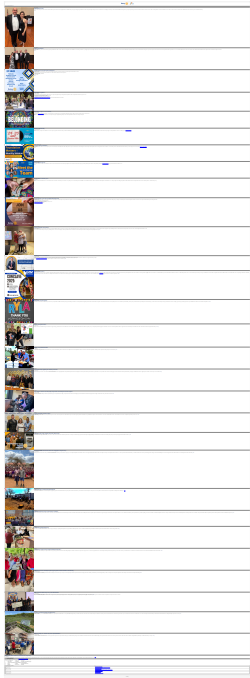

2025 Council on Legislation



Rotarians from all over the world met in Chicago, Illinois, USA, on 13-17 April to vote on proposed changes to the legislation that governs Rotary clubs. The representatives considered 78 proposals, such as:

- Increasing the dues that all members pay to Rotary International
- Allowing clubs to charter with as few as 15 members
- Allowing districts the option not to hold a district conference
- Allowing more governance model pilots beyond those being tested in districts in RIBI, New Zealand, and Australia

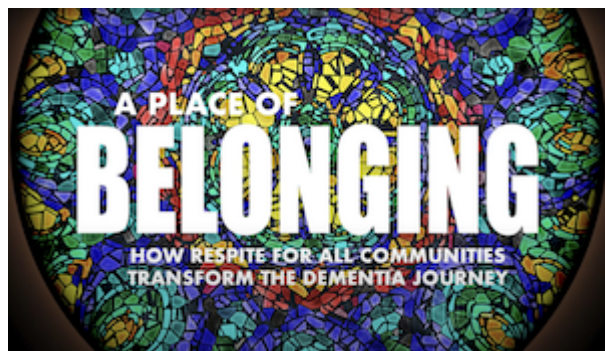
The Council meets every three years. Afterward, the general secretary issues a report on the actions taken by the Council. Clubs will have at least two months after the report is sent to submit their opposition. The council's adoption of legislation is suspended if the measure receives opposition from clubs representing at least 5% of the votes all clubs are entitled to cast.

Remember, 50% of all the funds contributed come back to the District as District Designated Funds (DDF) in three years - making our global and community grants possible. Rotarians and guests are invited to Conclave to welcome the Georgia Rotary Student Program Class of 2025-26 in Athens - August 15-17. Conclave is hosted this year by District 6910 and under the direction of the Athens, Oconee County and The Classic City of Athens Rotary Clubs.

Conclave is the kickoff event for GRSP and allows the international college scholarship students to interact with one another as well as Georgia Rotarians. Students, trustees, officers, host families and friends of the program will participate in important informational sessions beginning at 12:30 pm on

Friday at the University of Georgia Center for Continuing Education & Hotel, and throughout the day on Saturday. Here are some of the featured activities:

- District Governor Elect Jessica Fleetwood, Rotary Club of Etowah Cartersville, will open the Friday session with an introduction to Rotary International.
- Dr. Anna Westerstahl Stenport, Dean and UGA Foundation Professor of Arts and Sciences, Franklin College of Arts and Sciences, will be the keynote speaker for the scholars on Saturday. A native of Sweden, Shenport spent her first year of college as a GRSP scholar at UGA, sponsored by the Rotary Clubs of Peachtree City and Canton in 1993-94.
- A special welcome dinner for registered Rotarians and guests will be held Friday from 6-9 pm. Enjoy a Tuscan buffet for \$58 per person. Students will provide a short introduction and name their trustee and their sponsoring Rotary Clubs.
- Saturday evening attendees (6:15 to 9:15 pm) - business/smart attire, will enjoy a dinner and program at Mahler Hall - featuring the GRSP Cabaret, the popular variety-style performance and parade of flags The dinner will be \$63 per person for a Travelers Buffet. Afterwards, students and Rotarians will have separate mixer events, including a cash bar for Rotarians
- On Sunday morning, the students will experience the Ultimate Football Experience, getting a glimpse of Sanford Stadium and the West End Zone Facility, including historic displays, before leave at 11 AM to return to their respective colleges and universities or their host families.

Registration and Housing

GRSP students are pre-registered for the event and meals. They will be hosted by Athens-area Rotarians for the weekend.

Rotarians and guests may register for Friday and/or Saturday dinners through the GRSP web site at www.grsp.org. The UGA Center for Continuing Education & Hotel, 1197 S. Pumpkin St., Athens, GA 30602, has a block of rooms set aside for Conclave participants who need lodging - with a special GRSP limited-availability rate that's available for reservations made by July 2. Lodging reservations can be made via a link on the GRSP website - separate from the link to register for Conclave meals.

It's designed to equip our heroes with the confidence, clarity, and resources they need to thrive in civilian life.

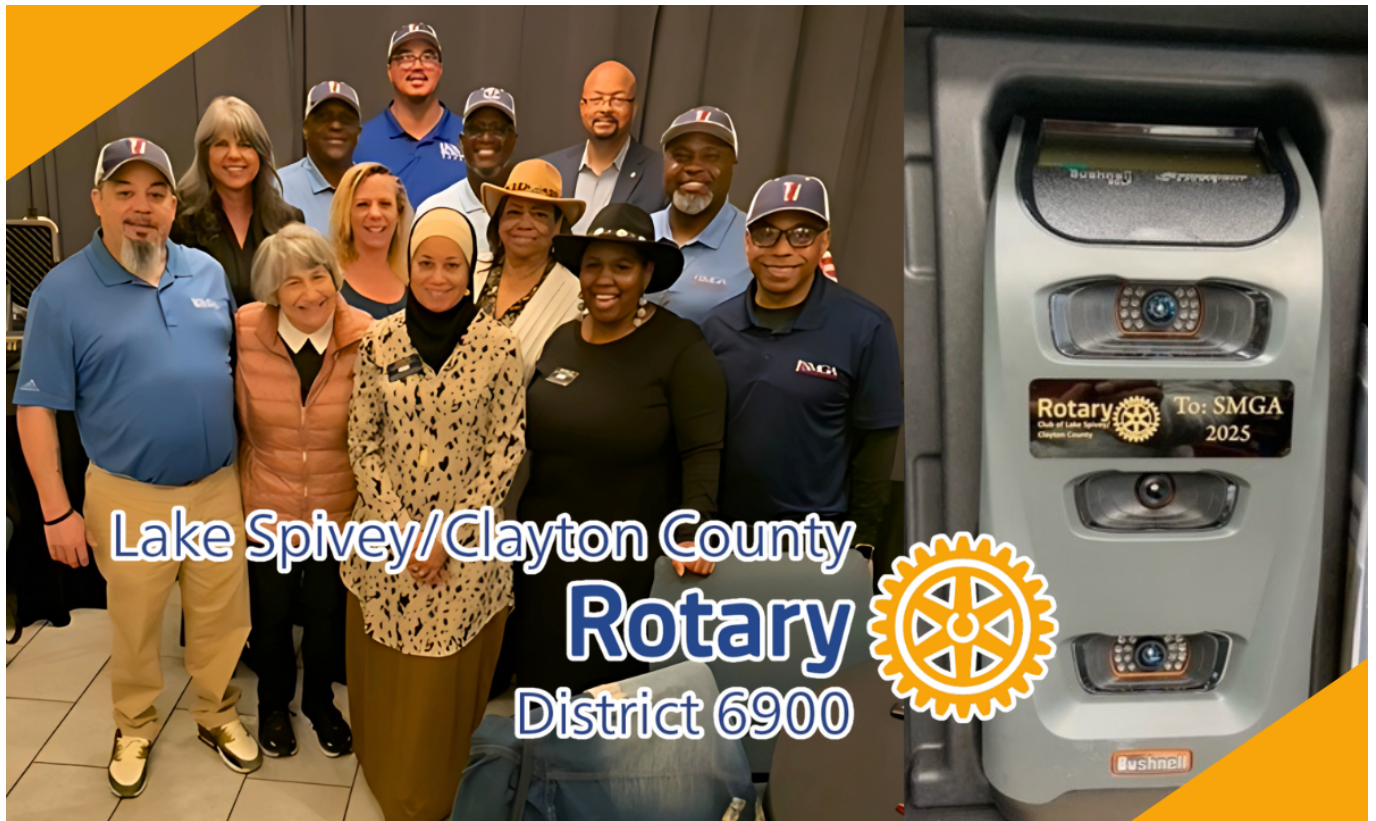
Many of the recipients were very humble and said they had no idea that anyone cared about the daily sacrifices they make to keep us safe.

Thomasville Joins with International Clubs for Life-Changing Water Project in Kenya



Partnering with Rotary Clubs in Ireland and Kenya, the **Rotary Club of Thomasville** is undertaking a water sanitation and hygiene project at the Olmapinu Comprehensive School in Rombo, Kenya. The school supports 424 Maasai tribe students and staffers, and complies with all Kenyan and tribal guidelines. Included in the build are 12 toilets for girls, five toilets and five urinals for boys, and additional facilities for staff, and younger and handicapped children. The project also includes handwashing stations, sanitation and hygiene education for children, females and staff, and funding for sustainability of the facilities.

Thomasville Rotarian and past club President Joe Brown is leading the club's involvement in the project. "Our club's 100% participation in fundraising for the Rotary Foundation helped us secure the global grant for the project. Our club was also responsible for providing \$15,000 in new money to the Rotary Foundation Annual Fund - Share, but the total Rotary Foundation funding made available for the project from the District and the Foundation totaled nearly \$67,000."

Joe also noted the significant cooperation among the various clubs working together to complete the project. "The Dublin Central, Ireland club was fundraising for a water project, so it made sense for us to come along and join them for the sanitation part. Working together with clubs from across the globe for a project of this magnitude has demonstrated the significance of Rotary, not only in the community, but everywhere."

Nearly 100 attendees filled the spacious Arrow Creek Community Room above the municipal offices of the City of Chamblee to hear speakers from seven different companies and organizations, including two officers from the City of Chamblee Police Department.

GRPA President Holly Geordies, one of the club's founding members, welcomed participants, saying, "GRPA is committed to fostering meaningful relationships through collaboration, professional development and public service." In this first even, GRPA successfully brought together five event sponsors, six community partners and four AAPI co-hosts. Representatives from the ;National Association of Chinese Americans, the Philippine American Chamber of Commerce of Georgia, OCA Georgia, and the Hong Kong-US Business Association were able to introduce themselves to summit participants.

GRPA was founded last October and has quickly grown from 12 to 30 total members, making it one of the fastest growing Rotary groups in Georgia. In May, the **Rotary Club of Columbus** partnered with its End Human Trafficking Now (EHTN) committee to host a private reception focused on strengthening community and legislative collaboration in the fight against child sex trafficking. This invitation-only event welcomed approximately 20 attendees, including state and local legislative representatives, Rotary leadership and advocates dedicated to ending human trafficking.

Rather than a public unveiling of the therapeutic garden at the Girls Rise Home, the reception centered on a more focused mission:

- Highlighting the impact - exploring how the therapeutic garden and trauma-informed spaces promote healing and emotional regulation for survivors
- Interactive tour - offering firsthand insight into how Micah's Promise is transforming lives through specialized care and support
- Focus on collaboration - deepening relationships between local and state leaders, the Rotary Club, and Micah's Promise to enhance collective impact
- Public policy engagement - encouraging meaningful dialogue on the role of legislation and government partnerships in preventing and addressing human trafficking

Many of the elected officials in attendance were visiting the home for the first time, gaining new understanding and appreciation for the social work being done behind the scenes at Micah's Promise.

"Our club was proud to host this intimate and impactful event, said Club President Meredith King. "It was an opportunity not only to witness the hope and healing happening at Micah's Promise but to build relationships that can lead to real change in our community and beyond."
