Our Rotary Foundation

Our Rotary Foundation is "Tops" Again!

Last month we got to share the successes of The Rotary Foundation and how fitting since it was

"Foundation" month. Therefore, we looked at the successes internally. This month we have the opportunity to celebrate the external successes as seen by others about us. Here is a great "Did you know?" question for you. Did you know The Rotary Foundation was honored with a "Four Star rating" which is the top rating a charity can receive from Charity Navigator for the 17th consecutive year? Charity Navigator is the independent charity evaluator in the country. Ratings are determined by Charity Navigator by a total examination of nonprofits specifically by how they use their funding, how they implement and sustain their programs and do they adhere to the industry's standards related to transparency and accountability of the total organization.

Charity Navigator began providing their ratings in 2001 and have rated over 225,000 charities. As they state on their website, "The metrics inform donors of not just where their dollars are going but what their dollars are doing.

To be ranked in the top category is no small feat and to be there for 17 consecutive years says ab awful lot about our mission and the application of it but also speaks volumes about our consistency in achieving our goals and the standards we have set. Certainly, we can all be proud of this accomplishment. November was truly an outstanding month for the Foundation in our district, and we are well on the way to achieving annual goal for 2025-2026. Remember your contributions to the Foundation can be designated to either Polio Plus or the Annual Fund and both count toward your individual contributions. All of us working together makes a huge difference.

Let me change gears now and shift to a video I had the opportunity to view. The video is entitled, "Rotary's fight against Polio: Global Progress and Updates from Pakistan." There were three panelists on the video: Past President Rotary International John Germ, who is a friend of mine, Holger Knaack, also a Past President Rotary International, and Dr. Arshad Quddus of the World Health Organization. The video is moderated by Carol Pandak, the Director of PolioPlus. If you are new or newer to Rotary and would like to get a good understanding as to where we stand in the fight to eradicate Polio in the world, it is a must-see video. For those quite familiar with the fight, you won't hear much by way of new information, but it will give you up to the minute numbers on where we are. Past President John reported as of November 11, 2025, that we have nine cases in Afghanistan and 30 cases in Pakistan of the wild-polio virus. In addition, there are 137 of what has now been labeled "the vaccine derived or the variant" most of which are in Africa giving a total of 176 worldwide, but that compares to 288 cases last year at this time, so the overall is a reduction of 39%. **You can view the video by clicking this link.**

They made sure to make the strong point of the tremendous partnerships we have in place today, the most significant being the partnership renewal with the Gates Foundation matching us \$2 to \$1. All of this is certainly good news for the fight and for leadership of the Rotary Foundation. So, the fight continues, but the prognosis is very good!! We'll keep fighting together!

We are pleased to announce that the Georgia Opioid Crisis Abatement Trust has provided our district with grant funding to help clubs do related projects in their communities. We have two projects to choose from, A Safe Drug Disposal Kiosk or an Overdose Rescue Box. Clubs can submit multiple grant requests (up to \$5000) using our district grant application system. Here are the steps to get started:

- 1. Make sure your club is eligible for funding by checking the **Grant Eligibility Page**
- 2. **Visit the Opioid Grants page** to learn more about the projects & how to apply
- 3. Apply for an Opioid Grant(s) by December 31, 2025
- 4. Complete your opioid grant project by March 31, 2026

Georgia residents who are enrolled in college are encouraged to apply for GRSP's 2026 International Summer School Scholarships. Georgia Rotary Student Program is proud to extend a total of four summer

scholarships to Georgia college students. Two scholarships will be awarded to study in Norway as part of the **Oslo International Summer School** (June 27-July 25, 2026) and two scholarships to Denmark at **Aarhus University** (July 1-July 25, 2026). Students must have a valid passport. Applications will be reviewed and all applicants will be notified by the end of January 2026.

School includes students from all over the world in a diverse cultural program in the beautiful city of Oslo, Norway with four weeks of academic achievement and international goodwill.

Denmark Scholarship includes undergraduate coursework, administered by the Aarhus University, room, board and administrative fees for the International Summer School at the Aarhus. The Denmark Scholarship does not include airfare.

The mission of the CART (Coins for Alzheimer's Research Trust) Fund is to raise seed money for bold, early-stage Alzheimer's research—ideas that might otherwise go unfunded but have the potential to unlock breakthroughs in prevention, treatment, and ultimately, a cure. CART is unique in that 100% of all donations go directly to Alzheimer's research, empowering scientists to gather the initial data needed to secure major grants and advance innovative discoveries. In June 2025, the CART Fund announced six grant recipients were awarded a total of \$2 million in funds for Alzheimer's research.

Rotary Friendship Exchange (RFE) is one of Rotary International's oldest but often lesser-known programs. It's essentially a **reciprocal exchange program** where Rotarians (and often their families) from one country visit Rotarians in another country or region, and then host them in return.

Belonging to a Rotary Inter-Country Committee (ICC) offers Rotarians a unique opportunity to promote international understanding, collaboration, and peace. Rotary has always emphasized global service, but ICCs strengthen this mission by connecting clubs from different countries and encouraging long-term partnerships. Members who participate in these committees gain both personal and professional benefits while making meaningful contributions to global goodwill.

District 6900 now has these two excellent programs in place. Last year, our PDG Gordon Owens and the PDGs of district 6910 and 6920 signed the ICC Charter with Serbia and Montenegro. (see charter document). This is a great way for clubs to be part of global grants. A partnership is already in place. All clubs need to do is plug in!

One key benefit is **cross-cultural exchange**. Through an ICC, Rotarians build friendships with members in other countries, learn about different cultures, and develop a clearer understanding of global issues

Another major benefit is the ability to **collaborate on impactful service projects**. ICCs help clubs from different countries combine resources, expertise, and manpower to address shared challenges.

The Rotary Friendship Exchange is a cultural exchange that builds international goodwill and peace. Participants live in Rotarians' homes (not hotels), so it's very personal and community-focused. Exchanges can be **individuals**, **couples**, **or groups** (typically 4–12 people).

The goals are to build cross-cultural understanding and friendships, strengthen club and district partnerships, lay foundations for future **service projects**, **grants**, **or youth programs**, and offer Rotarians authentic cultural immersion while traveling.

This is a great way to travel at low cost (lodging and many meals provided by hosts), see countries "through Rotary eyes," beyond tourism, and build lifelong friendships and sometimes professional connections. Most importantly it can spark joint international projects funded by **Rotary Foundation Global Grants**.



Celebrating North Fulton's Foundation Giving





This incredible under-50 member club that got its start in 2000 continues to excel, inspiring generosity like few others. Foundation giving is a vital, self-less, and often difficult task that makes our grants possible. And North Fulton Rotarians have donated more than \$900,000 to the Annual Fund in just 25 years as a club!

Foundation Chair Doug Higgins, President Erik Bykat, and District Grants Chair Mike Mudd recently announced two new members of the Bequest Society: Club President Elect Dan Jenkins (his \$50,000 Bequest leads the District) and Past President and Assistant Governor Joy Manbeck. This is after North Fulton Past President Richard Matherly committed the District's largest Bequest last year at \$50,000.

North Fulton has achieved:

- Top ten per capita Club in District 6900 the last 20 years
- \$908,000 in all time giving to the Annual Fund
- \$478 per capita giving in 2024-25
- Multiple Global Grant service projects

What is the Bequest Society? It allows deferred giving – committing to leave \$10,000 or more in your estate plans. Above \$25,000 allows a named, permanent fund - for example, "the Dan Jenkins Better World Fund." Each year the earnings go to the donor's designated area. It's easy. Roswell Honors Veterans



Without a doubt, **Roswell Rotary Club** loves celebrating our local and remote hometown heroes. With November being National Veterans and Military Families Month, and DG Steve Ivory focusing on services for Veterans, RRC President Trummie Lee Patrick III saw an opportunity to coordinate a three-peat service project. We packed 100 boxes for Naval personnel on ships around the world the first week of November, honored an amazing veteran with an entrepreneurial spirit the second week of November and the third week we stuffed backpacks for local homeless veterans.

Twice a year we pack boxes for an active military group that has a connection to Roswell or an RRC member. Championed by RRC long-time member Ralph Rowland, the members are asked to not only donate specifically requested items through an Amazon Wishlist but also stay after to pack, tape and

address the boxes. This year the 100 boxes were done in about 30 minutes because all meeting attendees were invited to participate. The committee had organized the pickup line so each person who picked up a box, grabbed one of each item with a note from Roswell Rotary *and* a local Interact Club student was on top. The filled box then moved to the taping/addressing table and stacked on a palate ready to be delivered to the USPS. It takes a village and an organized team, but the engagement of all is the magic that is Roswell Rotary Club.

New RRC member Retired Lt Colonel Michael Mizell, introduced RRC President Patrick to Veteran Chris Cathers, Founder and CEO of the Brothers Keeper Veteran Foundation. We honored Cathers as our November Hometown Hero and, a week later, we stuffed backpacks for homeless veterans at our New Member Social that were paid for with a secured Rotary District Grant! Sponsored by long-time RRC member and fellow retired Army Veteran Roger Wise, Mizell is a full-time champion for veterans through his volunteer position with Path Light Counseling Services as Director of Community Veterans Outreach. https://pathlightga.org/

Cathers is literally walking inspiration in human-form. Diagnosed with stage 4 cancer, the Brothers Keeper Foundation was created out of a desperate sense of providing help for veterans in need with no barriers to a solution. With a life enriched by experiences in the Special Forces and CIA, Chris has faced formidable challenges of his own, battling both PTSI and cancer. These trials ignited a deep personal determination to challenge the stigma surrounding mental health issues and to establish a proactive veteran-focused outreach program. His transformative story stands as a testament to the indomitable spirit of the human heart. Established in 2020, the Brothers Keeper Veterans Foundation is proof of that commitment by providing a robust network of support to ensure these individuals receive the care and understanding they deserve without exception. https://bkvf.org/

Having inducted 25 new members into RRC since July 1, President Patrick realized he had to keep them! Inviting all new members in the last two years as well as the board members past, present and future, he hosted a New Member Potluck at his home. Serving his signature smoked pork-butt bbq, side dishes filled the tables for about 75 guests. It was a great night of fellowship, introductions and deeper connections with a mission: To stuff backpacks for homeless veterans that Mizell and his team will be able to distribute across the streets of metro-Atlanta.


After a morning of hard work, members came together to celebrate their collective accomplishments.



About Camp Southern Ground



Roswell Rotarians Jump into Action on Student Meals and More



When Rotarians hear a need, they jump into action. Recently, Past President Jim Coyle and Interact Coordinator Becky Nelson - with unwavering support from **Roswell Rotary Club** President Trummie Lee

Patrick III - delivered a personal packet to the Social Workers for the nine public schools that have Roswell-sponsored Interact Clubs. Why? A Roswell Rotarian (who wishes to remain anonymous) learned there are students in North Fulton County (an affluent Atlanta suburb) eating a "cheese sandwich" because their cafeteria student account stood in arrears. When this Rotarian called both Jim and Becky to see what he could do, he kept saying, "Just ridiculous!" The immediate response - an impromptu quick hit practical service project.

Based on calls made, we created a strategy for the Roswell Rotarian to adopt an area public school cafeteria to ensure that every student was able to eat AND the cafeteria staff was able to serve while no longer paying personally for the students in need. He not only cured the cafeteria student accounts in arrears but also transferred enough funds to cover the rest of the 2025-26 academic year.

In speaking with the RHS Social Worker about our mission to "Clear the Cafeteria Student Accounts," we learned that the schools are seeing an unprecedented amount of need. Students who are accustomed to being the giver are asking for services. Especially food. Why? With inflation, the Federal Government shutdown and the pause on the SNAP program, a very wide scope of students are no longer finding food at home. School staff are being stretched with high absenteeism as well as elevated strife in the classroom, the cafeteria and other areas around campus because of the discourse at home. At our next two club meetings, we told the club what we had learned and asked folks to donate if they could. Over \$2,500 was received for our Families in Need which was used to buy Walmart gift cards for \$25. Divided evenly among the nine schools, the packets not only included the gift cards but also a hand-written note of appreciation from President Patrick for their personal commitment to the students and the greater school community. Each was delivered on the Wednesday prior to Thanksgiving directly to each Social Worker.

There were tears and a tenable sense of relief. Why? We knocked on the door unannounced because we had a gift versus a need. We personally came up with a quick, practical and immediate solution not to the problem but certainly on the road to it. School Social Workers were heard, seen and celebrated as the resources they are in our schools. Each Social Worker has responded with sincere appreciation for the gift cards but mainly for the handwritten personal note from RRC President Patrick.

The Rotary Ripple effect is real in Roswell.

- Two additional Roswell Rotarians have offered to adopt a school cafeteria each.
- A Roswell Rotarian offered financial assistance to a family in need. The offer was mentioned in a follow-up e-mail to the social workers on Thursday and, within two hours, a local high school replied. They had a senior in good standing that needed immediate financial help because his father's income was stopping. He was going to quit school to work to pay the rent. Discussions happened and the Rotarian has agreed to pay the December rent so the student can finish this first semester without worrying.
