2017/2018 Theme — Rotary: Making A Difference

July always brings a new Rotary year and a new Rotary leadership team from top to bottom. As your new District Governor I promise to do my best to help you make 2017/2018 as impactful (and painless!) a Rotary year as possible. I'm looking forward to visiting each club, meeting more great Rotarians, and learning more about the many communities in our district.

Polio. We are so very close in our 30-plus year effort to eradicate polio. We owe it to the children of the future—and those Rotarians who have been carrying this load for the past 32 years—to finish the job, and that takes money. I've asked each club to consider **donating 5%** of the money they raise towards Polio Plus and the final eradication of this disease. Five percent is not much of a burden on any club, but multiply that amount times 35,000 clubs and we can change the world forever—finally.

Membership. Yes, retention is important and if your club is getting clobbered with high attrition rates, then your club needs to take a hard look at the experience you are providing your Rotarians. But the reality is that **only by attracting new members can Rotary grow**. That doesn't mean signing up anyone who has a pulse. But there are ten million people in Georgia and only about 10,000 Rotarians. Even if we assume that only 1% of our ten million citizens would be good Rotarians, that's 100,000 Rotarians, ten times our current size. Every club has a massive opportunity to grow.

Innovation. There is a natural tendency to repeat success. But somewhere along the way a great project or tradition becomes stale and loses vitality. A mentor of mine taught me that the **essence of strategy is**

denial. It is deciding what to stop doing, because when you stop doing something that frees up resources to do something new. I strongly encourage every club to drop something they have been doing in favor of something new. As PRID Robert Hall points out, to take no risks is to guarantee failure.

Of course, all of these folks have teams working with them as well – don't be shy about calling for a speaker, a question or just plain help.

The District Grants have been completed and submitted to The Rotary Foundation. As of July 3, we are still awaiting approval. As soon as that happens, Treasurer Will (who has your grant check already completed) will drop your money in the mail. When that happens, you can begin your project. Remember, this year, your receipts must be scanned into the D6900 website to document how your grant money was spent! Questions? Contact Mary Ligon.

We have another big change this year that I hope you will like – online Global Grant Qualification. Every year, any club that wants to do a Global Grant must get qualified. That means you participate in grant training and we report it to The Rotary Foundation. Instead of holding a Foundation Seminar in August, the training is online at rotary6900.org. Simply click the Resource tab, scroll down and click Global Grants. There is a lot of information there, and the qualification information is in a box on the right hand side. The process is simple, watch all 4 videos, read the documentation resources and take the quiz. You can only take the quiz once every 24 hours, so read carefully. Once you pass the quiz, you are qualified to serve on your club's global grant committee! Big thanks to Governor Alec for the computer support to make this possible. Questions? Give Margie Kersey or Anne Glenn a call.

We won't be holding a Million Dollar Dinner this year (whew!), but we will be holding two Foundation events – one in October for Polio and one in February for Major Donors. Keep an eye out for more information.

We are still trying to become a 100% Paul Harris Fellow club district and we are very close. As of July 1 there are only TEN clubs that have not achieved this once in a lifetime goal (remember – you can only earn this banner once). If you would like some advice or help in reaching this recognition, please contact Gerry Bilbro. He has some great ideas for helping you go the distance.

Now is the time to ask for Foundation speakers – especially if you want someone to speak in November. Thomasville Project Gives Serbian Orphans Marketable Skills

Thanks to the **Thomasville Rotary Club**, teenage orphan and foster youth in Serbia are learning computer skills that will give them a better chance at self-supporting lives. The club donated \$7,500 to the project, which was matched by a district grant of \$7,500 and a Rotary Global Grant that brought the total to \$30,000.

The project organized by local Rotarian Walter Gilbert purchased 30 computers for an orphanage in Belgrade and two centers for foster children elsewhere in the country. Gilbert became aware of the need through his work as CEO of An Open Door Adoption Agency Inc. He coordinated on the project with Nenad Sakovik, the president of a Belgrade Rotary Club.

"We wanted them to have marketable skills so they could become self-supporting," Gilbert said. About 70% of the orphan children become involved in drugs, crime or prostitution, he said, and 10% commit suicide within five years of leaving the orphanage. "Only 20% find meaningful lives."

Sakovik said more than 200 individuals have been trained using the computers. "I'm happy that the project has fulfilled its goal," he wrote to Gilbert. "I thank you for all your efforts on this."

East Cobb Recognizes Local Citizen for Courage and Perservance



In June, the **Rotary Club of East Cobb** presented Susan Jenkins with the David Butts Award. The David Butts' Award is named for East Cobb Rotarian, Dr. David Butts, and honors an individual in the community at large who has demonstrated courage and perseverance in the face of a personal challenge. Nominations are voted on by club membership and the award includes a \$1,000 donation to the charity of the recipient's choice.

Dr. Butts joined the Rotary Club of East Cobb in its first year, and has since been a dedicated, passionate and enthusiastic Rotarian - has mentoring, encouraging, and inspiring generations of East Cobb citizens, through his work with Rotary, and as an educator, father, husband, friend, citizen, and servant to all who have had the pleasure to know him. Recently, David has faced a daunting personal challenge in the form of an aggressive cancer. True to his nature, David not only met the challenge with tenacity, but did so

without losing his buoyant, faith-driven optimism. David's journey has been physically, mentally, and emotionally grueling. There have been setbacks to match many of the steps forward. More than once, the news was very bleak. However, David never seemed to waiver from his love of life and the joy he found in being around his friends and family in Rotary. The fact that David maintained perfect Rotary attendance (sometimes even doing make-up meetings at M.D. Anderson Hospital in Houston) is just one example of his undaunted spirit.

Much like David, Susan has dedicated her life to educating children. In the midst of raising her own young son and daughter, Susan was diagnosed with cancer following and given only a 25% chance of survival. However, Susan is a fighter. During long, grueling periods of chemo and radiation therapy, she maintained a positive attitude and was often fond of saying, "I'm not going to die, God isn't done with me yet!" With tenacity, courage, perseverance, and strong faith, Susan beat cancer. Unfortunately, this was just the beginning of Susan's battle, as she dealt with other health issues that resulted from her cancer treatment. That said, Susan has overcome those obstacles and returned to full time teaching. She strives to create a fun, challenging and encouraging environment for her students, and enjoys working with special needs students and leading the drama club. Susan continues to tutor and mentor former students, regularly travels on domestic and international mission trips with her church, and shares with everyone she encounters her faith, her never-give up attitude, and her uplifting spirit.

For these reasons, and so many more, the Rotary Club of East Cobb was honored to present Susan Jenkins with this years David Butt's Award.

When Rotarians gathered in Atlanta last month for the Rotary International Convention, more than 100 GRSP alumni gathered too - along with GRSP directors, trustees and host families, for the **first ever all-class GRSP reunion**. The reunion offered great opportunities to showcase the 71-year old program, with alumni from as far back as the 1960s.

- Groups gathered for special GRSP events at the Atlanta Botanical Gardens on Saturday evening ... and again at the Fox Theater's Egyptian Ballroom on Tuesday of convention week for fun, fellowship and testimonials from past students about the difference GRSP made in their lives. We heard from a couple who met during their GRSP year and were celebrating their 25th wedding anniversary - as well as the fact that their son was a 2016-17 GRSP student. Another student shared that the love of rowing she developed while attending school in Georgia led to her joining her country's national rowing team and competing in the Olympics. And many shared that GRSP had changed their perspectives on the world - and that they felt the program was more important now than ever as an

agent of promoting peace and understanding among the people of the world.

- On Sunday, 40 GRSP alumni joined forces with students from Rotary Youth Exchange to bring in the flags of the world at the Opening Ceremonies of the RI Convention. The flag ceremony has always been a special part of RI Conventions - and it was even more special to have students participating from our most recent class of 2016-17 all the way back to the class of 1995-96. GRSP alumni were privileged to carry in the Rotary flag at both opening sessions.

And now we are getting ready to welcome the class of 2017-18! Students will begin arriving in August. As clubs and host families prepare for students to arrive:

- **Take a look at your student's "suitcase" to be sure that they have the things that they need to make their stay in a dorm a pleasant one.** It is very easy to just recycle everything that your student from last year had, but it is a gift to your new student to take a look at what you have and throw out a few things that may have become worn out over the years. Some students take excellent care of the items in their suitcase, but others.....well..... not so much.
- **Make sure you are ready to greet your students at the airport** - communicate with your student now if you haven't already so you know exactly when they are arriving. Try to get a group to be there and think about making signs to add to the welcome.
- **Be sure your student knows when your club meets** - encourage them to attend meetings and invite them to participate in your social activities and service projects. Students should be speaking at your clubs early in the Rotary year - to tell you more about themselves and their countries.
- **Encourage club members to invite your student to their homes or special activities throughout the year** - your student, your members and your families will benefit from getting to know each other. And start to think about plans for the holidays - how can you best share those special times with your GRSP student.

Georgia's Rotary Youth Exchange Scholarship Recipients Are Ready To Go!



After nearly one full year of preparation, Georgia's very first class of Future Outbound Candidates graduated today to receive the official, prestigious, title of Rotary Youth Exchange Students. These 10 amazing Georgia high school students will represent Georgia's Rotary District 6900 for one academic year in another country. District 6900's first class of Rotary Youth Exchange Scholarship students have spent the last eight months preparing for the experience of a lifetime. In the next few weeks, these extraordinary high school students from the greater Atlanta area will depart for an academic year abroad, living with local families selected by Rotary, and attending local high schools, while becoming fluent in a new language, and living Rotary values every day.

To prepare for their year abroad, Georgia's Rotary Youth Exchange students have spent the last eight months studying all things Rotary, the language and culture of their assigned country, as well as presentation, cultural and resiliency skills. Our students took part in two formal training sessions in Lake Yale, Florida, together with nearly 100 other Rotary Youth Exchange students from Florida. They have visited many Rotary meetings and participated actively in the Rotary International Convention in Atlanta. Each student prepared a detailed research paper on their assigned country, and Rotary's role in that country, and have achieved at least a conversational level of fluency in their target language. After completing their final assignments and successfully completing workshops on culture and learning to adapt to other cultures, our students became qualified to graduate, and they earned the right to wear the prestigious Rotary blue blazer that identifies Rotary Youth Exchange students around the world.

The Rotary Youth Exchange program is one of the world's largest and most prestigious high school exchange programs. Each year, nearly 9000 high school students qualify and participate in the program. Rotary clubs in District 6900 may award the Rotary Youth Exchange Scholarship, valued at over \$24,000 to talented, qualified high school students in their community, at no cost to the local Rotary club.

Check Out the Global Grant Scholarship Opportunities - Applications Due October 16

Do you know a young person who is ready for graduate study and wants to study abroad? Do they have career goals which are consistent with Rotary Foundation Areas of Focus? Are they committed to service and interested in building a relationship with a Rotary Club in another country? Would \$30,000 help them achieve their education goals? If the answer to these questions is yes, then let them know about the Global Grant Scholarship funded by The Rotary Foundation.

District 6900 is offering two competitive \$30,000 scholarships for graduate study starting the fall of 2018. The student's career goals must align with at least one of the Rotary Foundation Areas of Focus: Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution, Disease Prevention and Treatment, Water and Sanitation, Maternal and Child Health, Basic Education and Literacy, and Economic and Community Development.

Scholars may NOT be a Rotarian; an employee of a club, district, or any other Rotary entity; or the spouse, a lineal descendant, or an ancestor of any person in the first two categories. Scholars MAY BE a member of a Rotaract Club. Scholars must have residence in District 6900 or must be employed full time in the District or be a fulltime student in a university in the District.

More News from the Clubs



Children benefiting from Alpharetta's summer lunch program

Alpharetta Provides Summer Lunches

Volunteers from the **Rotary Club of Alpharetta** partnered with Coordinators from the Ed Isakson/Alpharetta Family YMCA to distribute lunches and engage with children from the Aspen Pointe Apartment complex. The summer lunch program is committed to feeding children who fall into the category of "food insecure," and normally receive a free or reduced lunch during the school year. Rotarians will continue to volunteer every Wednesday at 11:45am until children return to school in August.

The program is wonderfully simple, and yet enormously impactful. According to No Kid Hungry campaign, "Food insecurity—the limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate and safe food— exists in 17.2 million households in America, 3.9 million of them with children." The Summer Lunch Program will strive to provide children in need in the Alpharetta community with guaranteed lunch five days a week.

Each weekday, the meals are prepared by MUST Ministries at Roswell United Methodist Church. The YMCA Summer Feeding Program Coordinator then transports the 80 to 120 meals to the Aspen Pointe apartment complex. Here, two to six volunteers distribute lunches to the children. This is also a time for volunteers from the Rotary Club of Alpharetta to interact with students in planned activities and games on the outside basketball court.

North Atlanta Partners with Interfaith Outreach Home

North Atlanta Rotarians reached out to the Interfaith Outreach Home (IOH) in the Chamblee/Doraville area, to find out how we could help and support them. Interfaith Outreach Home serves up to ten families at a time for up to two years each. IOH is an in-depth program providing safe and secure housing, many supportive resources, and time to transition (up to 2-years), while it requires mandatory saving and accountability from participants. The program provides guidance, multi-faceted life-skills trainings and mentors to formerly homeless families willing to participate in this very stringent program capable of breaking the cycle of homelessness and poverty. Graduate families of this program transition into stable lives, often including home ownership made possible by the mandatory savings component of the program.

So far, the club's support has included stepped in to provide the evening meal for the Life Skills Class participants and their families and "channeling" their Tom Sawyer and Huck Finn personalities to spruce up the yard and paint the picket fence and shed. The club's connections with IOH go back to the beginning of the home with builder Don Millen, a long time North Atlanta Rotary Club member and Past President, as well as with several other club members who have initiated club service projects over the years.

Happy New Year on the Fourth of July

Each year, the **Rotary Club of LaGrange** provides marshals on the 4th of July for our Sweet Land of Liberty children's parade. And, **Dunwoody** Rotarians sell hot dogs and share the Independence Day Celebrations at the City of Dunwoody's annual parade.

The **Rotary Club of Griffin** had a great program in June featuring Jason Clark from Southeastern Reptile Rescue.
